

Nottingham has earned a strong reputation for **LEADING** the way when it comes to style. Of course, Nottingham is much bigger than visitors initially realise. It's famous for its underground CAVES **NETWORK**, with over 800 caves under your feet! The city makes great use of this space – you can do the <u>City of Caves</u> tour to see how they were used throughout history, and there are plenty of quirky, secret and cosy underground bars for you to explore.







Known around the world as the home of Robin Hood, Nottinghamshire has **IDYLLIC** rural landscapes with gentle rolling hills, the mighty River Trent and ancient Sherwood Forest.

National Justice Museum

The National Justice Museum is housed in Nottinghamshire's old Shire Hall and County Gaol. The museum uses original courtrooms, dungeons and prison cells, to exhibit collections relating to justice, the law, crime and punishment in a fun and interactive way.

National Ice Centre

Nottingham's <u>National Ice Centre</u> was the first twin Olympic-sized ice rink facility in the UK.

Nottingham has a long tradition of ice skating; most well known for the Nottinghamshire couple Jane Torvill and Christopher Dean who went on to dominate the World Olympic Championships.



National Civil War Centre


The UK's first ever National Civil War

control Newark, a staunchly Royalist town,
was one of the defining events of the Civil
War. Explore the deadly battles for power in
17th century Britain during the British Civil
Wars.

National Water Sports Centre

Home to world-class water sports facilities, visitors can try adrenalin-filled activities from white water rafting and wakeboarding to land-based activities such as laser tag, a cross-country adventure course or mini golf.







Nottingham boasts a thriving music and arts scene. Peggy's Skylight is where the region's jazz and blues musicians call home- it offers regular feet-tapping live music and an incredible atmosphere.

If you're looking for a legendary music venue and club, look no further than Nottingham's Rock City. It has regularly been voted the best live music venue in the UK and hosted some of the greatest bands and artists, such as Nirvana, David Bowie, and Amy Winehouse.









Sherwood Forest and the LEGENDARY Major Oak are arguably Nottinghamshire's calling cards. The hundreds of acres of forest are now in the care of the RSPB, and visitors can EXPLORE the brand new visitor centre to learn more about the flora, fauna and legends of this beautiful, ANCIENT woodlands

But Nottinghamshire is home to many more wonderful green spaces including Wollaton Hall & Deer Park, Thoresby Park and Clumber Park.





Nottinghamshire, recently voted as one of the best family destinations in the world by National Geographic, has some fantastic family-friendly attractions for all ages and in all weathers. Get up close to friendly animals at White Post Farm, Manor Farm Park & Woodlands or the Tropical Butterfly House, or have a family-packed day out at the all-weather Robin Hood's Wheelgate Theme Park or Twinlakes Family Theme Park.

Nottingham's <u>Goose Fair</u> is Europe's largest travelling fair, and with hundreds of attractions, it's fun for all ages and an unmissable October event.








Nottinghamshire has a number of options, from mind-bending escape rooms to minigolf, trampoline parks, river cruises or <u>Go</u>

Nottingham is home to two world class universities – pushing the boundaries of innovation, research and scientific discovery.

NOTTINGHAM TRENT UNIVERSITY was named Modern University of the Year in the Times Good University Guide in 2018.

The UNIVERSITY OF NOTTINGHAM is part of the UK's prestigious Russell Group of Universities and recently acquired the Castle Meadow Campus giving them a city centre presence.







We're also home to many award-winning restaurants, including the Michelin-starred Restaurant Sat Bains with Rooms and Alchemilla. The city centre has a great reputation for diverse and independent cuisines from all over the world, and there are plenty of cafés and bars to suit all tastes.

Of course, if you're looking for a traditional English pub, then look no further than Ye Olde Trip To Jerusalem, England's oldest inn. But Nottingham also boasts a pub with a barge, a Victorian Music Hall and several of its own breweries.







Nottinghamshire is one of only three counties which are allowed to produce the <u>award-winning Stilton cheese – well worth a taste</u> when visiting. Nottinghamshire's is also home to the delicious Colwick cheese.


Southwell, a town in the heart of


Nottinghamshire, is famous as the home of the

The <u>School of Artisan Food</u>, named *Cookery School of the Year* at the British Cookery

School Awards 2014, forges a reputation of renown food courses.







Nottinghamshire is home to three National Trust sites. Discover the untouched family home of a 1920s grocer at Mr Straw's House in Worksop, and experience the hard daily life of a Victorian at The Workhouse in Southwell - the last complete workhouse in existence. Explore the stunning Clumber Park, a Ducal estate home to a Victorian Walled Kitchen Garden, fine dining restaurant, and acres of beautiful parkland.

The historic town of Southwell is famed for its iconic <u>Minster</u>. The late 13th century Chapter House contains the world famous 'Leaves of Southwell' stone carvings.







The <u>Mayflower Pilgrims</u> were religious separatists who voyaged to America in 1620 from North Nottinghamshire, where their beliefs were shaped.

The <u>Pilgrim Roots trail</u> includes Scrooby,
Babworth and other nearby destinations
including Gainsborough, Austerfield, Retford
and Boston. We recommend a guided tour of
these sights to explore the history or even
trace your ancestral roots; <u>Brackenbury's</u>
<u>Britain</u> and <u>Pilgrims & Prophets</u> all provide
tailored and unique tours.
