






NOTTINGHAM

Nottingham is one of the UK's most historical cities,

where you can experience 1,000 years of history at Nottingham Castle, fresh off the back of a £30 million transformation. You can stop by for a drink in the oldest inn in England, the Ye Olde Trip to Jerusalem, and explore the hidden caves that twist and turn beneath the city streets. Being a small city, Nottingham is also easy to explore on foot and benefits from an award-winning tram system. However, don't let its small size deceive you, Nottingham is a city with a truly vibrant music and

arts scene. The internationally-acclaimed Nottingham Contemporary stands as testament to the city's brilliant arts scene. The Hockley area of the city, just off the historic Lace Market (once the lace making capital of the world), is home to some incredible independent venues, with great places to eat and explore if you fancy something with a more alternative feel.

Businesses in retail and hospitality have also worked tirelessly to ensure Nottingham has been able to welcome visitors back safely. From working with Visit England's "We're Good to Go!" scheme, to supporting one-way systems throughout the city centre Nottingham's tourism, hospitality and retail offering has worked hard to ensure Nottingham remains a safe destination to visit.

Nottingham is also blessed with stunning architecture, the home of Watson Fotheraill, famed for his use of contrasting red and blue bricks as well as elaborate turrets on buildings. 



Nottingham has always been a city of brave **heroes** and charismatic rebels. While some of the city's protagonists are better known than others, their stories have all contributed to Nottingham's identity as a place where people have the courage to stand up for what's right, not what is easy.

Nottinghamshire's pioneers have battled the odds to bravely blaze trails for others to follow. These pioneers may not have realised the remarkable impact they would have during their own lives, but their actions have reverberated through time and continue to inspire new generations in Nottingham and beyond.

ROBIN HOOD | HERO

Robin Hood is synonymous with Nottingham, and the world's mostbeloved folk hero needs little introduction. A true champion of social justice, Robin fought for the poor and needy, opposing the tyrannical powers of the cruel Sheriffol Nottingham. Reminders of Robin's mischief and misadventure are everywhere in Nottinghamshire - whether it's the beautiful church of St Mary's where he and Maid Marion were married, or the grimy cells in the belly of the National Justice Museum – which failed to keep him behind lock and key for long. Visitors can re-live the legend in Nottingham Castle's brand-new Interactive galleries and may even catch sight of the famous hooded hero roaming the streets of Nottingham. Ezekial Bone offers engaging, character-led town tours, retelling Robin's adventures with trademark flait. Head out into legendary Sherwood Forest, to walk amongst the ancient forests and soaring trees, which played host to countless medieval skirmishes. A new Visitor Centre stands close to his famous hideout - The Major Oak - and the grand old oak stands deliant to this day.


ADA LOVELACE I PIONEER

Ada Lovelace was a true visionary of a mathematician. Often described as the first computer programmer, she saw the potential for computers to become the world-changing devices they are today. She was one of the first people to see uses for computers beyond being pure calculation machines. Daughter of Lord Byron, Ada was buried beside her infamous lather at the Church of St. Mary Magdalene, in the market town of Hudmall. A small memorial stands at the church. Today, her pioneering work is celebrated globally, and she even has a cryptocurrency named in her honour:



LITERARY HEROES | HERO

Some of the most celebrated and provocative literary heroes ever to put pen to paper, Lord Byron and D.H. Lawrence, have deep ties with the area, and continue to inspire with their remarkable legacies. Visit the ancestral home of the "mad, bad and dangerous to know" Lord Byron at beautiful Newstead Abbey. Despite his wealth and eccentricity, Lord Byron still used his prominence to speak up in support of Nottingham's frame-breakers in Parliament in 1811. Walk in D.H. Lawrence's footsteps by visiting his birthplace in Eastwood. A lovingly recreated miner's cottage which serves as a portal back to life in 1885, and sits in the very house where the famous author was born.



Nottingham's pioneers have also ushered in astonishing medical breakthroughs. SIP Peter Mansheld – who sadly passed away in 2017 – gifted the transformative power of MRI scanners to the world. He ptoneered the technology while working as a Professor at the University of Nottingham, even becoming the first live patient to test out the prototype machine. He was knighted and bestowed with the Preedom of Nottingham in honour of his remarkable legacy. Look out to see his name adoming one of the city's trams during your visit.



There is good reason to believe the story of 'the boy who never grew up' was inspired by Nottingham's beautiful Arboretum. The author, J.M. Barrie, honed his writing skills working for the Nottingham Journal and regularly enjoyed walks through the Neverland-like park. If you visit Pelham Street, you can see a plaque to Barrie, while a wander through the Arboretum — which hosts outdoor theatre and music — always inspires wonder.



ERIC IRONS | PIONEER

Eric irons lived an astonishing life and had a momentous impact on Notitingham's history. Born in Jamaica, he would fly for the RAF, before moving to Nottingham and campaigning tirelessly to improve the rights and opportunities available to all. He broke new ground by becoming Britain's first black Magistrate in 1962, and his pioneering legacy has been honoured with a plaque on the wall of the National Justice Museum. There is also a bold mural on the canal towpath, close to Carrington Street bridge.



NED LUDD | HERO

Nottingham's people have never taken kindly to injustice. Despite the modern meaning of funditie, the real Luddities were textile workers, who protested by breaking the machines that were devaluing their employment at a time of poverty and food shortages. Ned Ludd was the mythical leader of the movement, and while he may not have ever actually existed, whispers of his presence inspired the protesters and spooked the authorities. Visit framework knitters Museum in Ruddington to learn more about Ned Ludd and the movement. Walk round to see how a local Victorian community lived and worked and try your hand at knitting on a 19th century sock machine.

GEORGE AFRICANUS I PIONEER

Contemporary Nottingham is a hotbed of independent businesses and is regularly named as one of the UKS most entrepreneurial cities. George Africanus was a true borthbearer, making history as the city! first black entrepreneur. Brought to England as a slave aged three, he went on to establish an employment agency in Nottingham and become a property owner and landlord in the city after finding his freedom.

DR STEWART ADAMS | PIONEER

Another hero of medicine, Dr Stewart Adams, is known as the father of ibuprolen. While working at Boots - which was established in Nottingham - he and Dr John Nicholson developed the game-changing painkiller together. He passed away aged 95 in 2019 and is honoured with a blue placue at the BioCity Nottingham building. There is also a bridge named in his memory, which connects the University of Nottingham with the Boots campus.





A CREATIVE CITY PACKED WITH CULTURE

Nottingham is a creative and vibrant city which has always been at the forefront of culture as one of the UK's largest small cities. From D.H. Lawrence to Paul Smith, the history of the area is rich with famous creatives, cultural staples and attractions which you can learn about on your visit to our spectacular city – and we're still leading the way. We continue to lead the UK today in creative fields through innovation as a hub for creative industries.

Nottingham is a **UNESCO City of Literature**, one of only 43 cities around the world recognised by UNESCO for literary excellence. With a thriving literary and creative scene, Nottingham hosts everything from talks and workshops to poetry and comedy festivals. We are a leading destination for lovers of literature worldwide and this is not to mention our famous literary heritage, claiming Lord Byron, D.H. Lawrence, J.M. Barrie and Alan Sillitoe among our famous residents over time.



You can still visit some of these historic literary spaces today. **Newstead Abbey**, once home to Lord Byron, is one of the most popular attractions just outside of the city, in **Ravenshead**. You can also see several plaques around the city centre with literary significance including J.M. Barrie's former office and another of Lord Byron's residences. Discover more at the **D.H. Lawrence Birthplace Museum** In Eastwood and walk in Lawrence's footsteps by taking the Blue Line Trail, and explore the countryside that inspired novels such as the *Women in Love* and *Lody Chatterley's Lover*.

Today, you can explore Nottingham with one of our creative and unique tours and tour guides. We recommend the **Nutty Nottingham Comedy Tour, Gold Star Guides** or **Ezekial Bone's Robin Hood Tour of Nottingham**, where fantastically creative hosts will guide your journey through the city centre, covering many interesting facts about the cultural history of the area. From the history of lace making to the internationally beloved legend of Robin Hood, this is a brilliant way to learn lots in a short amount of time.



While you're walking around, you are bound to see some of our armazing street art and murals. These are most notable in Hockley, located to the east of Old Market Square and up the hill. This area is also home to the 'Rainbow Road', which celebrates the LGBTQIA+ community of Nottinghamshire. You will also find Broadway – a cinema and restaurant with the world's first (and only) Paul Smith-designed cinema auditorium, and a stunning glass front that can host digital art projections. The cinema regularly shows unique films that you may not be able to catch anywhere else, and was the first cinema in the UK to screen Quentin Tarantino's Pulp Fiction. You might even be able to catch the Mayhem horror festival on your visit!



If you are looking for a show in Nottingham, you will find no shortage of amazing venues. We have many theaters including; the Theatre Royal & Royal Concert Hall and Nottingham Playhouse. The Theatre Royal often show a mix of events including touring theatre productions, comedy, opera and ballet. Nottingham Playhouse also shows a diverse mix, but mainly showcases independent productions, often starring local talent and running workshops for Nottinghamshire creatives. If you're looking for live music, why not try Metronome for that perfect indie gig, Rock City for some of the best bands in the UK or the Motorpoint Arena Nottingham for world-class artists including the likes of Michael Bublé and Bryan Adams.

Nottingham Contemporary is a stunning modern art gallery in the heart of the city centre. You will be able to easily recognise it from the lace inlay on their concrete façade – a tasteful homage to Nottingham's creative and industrial past. This gallery is located in the Creative Quarter – an area and organisation of Nottingham dedicated to championing the local creative economy. Here, you can also catch Sneinton Market; home to many amazing markets and cultural events.



Just across town, you can step into the future at **Zero Latency**. Well, maybe not the future, but it is the world's only large-scale, free-roam, multi-player virtual reality gaming arena. Here, technology and creativity are one and the same. You can take down zombies or rogue drones in one game or try out their *Call of Duty* experience.



Some landmark events you may want to catch include **Beat the Streets** towards the start of the year, **Splendour** in the summer, and **Goose Fair** or the **Nottingham Comedy Festival** towards the end of the year. All year round you have the opportunity to catch some of the Old Market Square events. You will be amazed at how one of the biggest squares in the UK can be transformed into anything from a **Summer Beach** to a Christmas Market and **Winter Wonderland**, which are beloved by locals and tourists alike.
